He elaborated how change in body posture can impose effects on our mind and thought process. The workshop was interesting and informative, as it focuses on training of the mind and dealing with stress. Institute of Vocational Studies organized a one day Student Seminar on the theme "School Education in India: Opportunities, Issues Challenges" on 4th October, 2019 in Awadh Auditorium. The main objective of the seminar was to promote quality education. Theoretical and research papers were presented by Students, Pupil Teachers, Research Scholars of various Universities and Affiliated Colleges.
